## Shriram EPC bags two new projects

Chennai, May 19:

Shriram EPC Ltd (SEPC), a provider of engineering and project management services and manufacturer of wind turbine generators, has been awarded orders amounting to Rs 125 crore.

The first order of an amount of Rs 49 crore was from Prakash Industries Ltd (PIL) to set up a coal handling plant at its Champa power plant in Chhattisgarh. The company has also received orders totaling Rs 76 crore from Bangalore Water Supply and Sewerage Board (BWSSB) for providing sewerage systems to

the erstwhile K R Puram and Bommanahalli CMC areas. Commenting on the order wins, Shriram EPC Ltd managing director and CEO T Shivaraman said, 'we are pleased with these project contracts which pertain to different verticals of the company's service offerings. This is indicative of increased on-the-ground traction across all our business segments.

The improved operating environment has led to a larger number of enquiries and we are striving to convert these into more orders.' Further, he said these order wins combined with recently bagged project from SAIL at the start of the first

The scope of work for the PIL award includes the design, engineering, supply, fabrication, erection and commissioning of the coal

handling plant to cater to the requirements of the 300 MW power project. The project was expected to be commissioned by March 2011.

SEPC has rich experience in building material handling systems and municipal services and has ex-

ecuted several projects earlier. Last year, the company had enhanced its offerings in the material handling space as it entered into a partnership with Roberts and Schaefer, the US company, to make high-tech equipment.

In another project win, SEPC would supply and lay SWG, RCC pipes for the sewerage system of BWSSB. The company would construct manholes and relay a number of damaged roads.

While the PIL work would be completed in two years, the company would finish the BWSSB project in three years.
